To worship God, grow as Jesus' disciples, care for one another, and take God's love to the world.

A meditation on: For God so loved the world (John 3:16).

A favourite verse for many Christians, we have heard it often, memorized it, and repeated it. But can we give it some sustained reflection? Not just with our mind but even more with our heart, because our heart knows things our mind cannot know.

For God so loved the world.

Do you believe this? This is a 'mind' question, and you can answer 'yes' or 'no.'

But what if we do not 'think' so much as allow this mystery to just sink into our soul and find its level there. Let us park our chattering mind for a while.

God so loved the world.

Sit with these words for 5 minutes, 20 minutes would be better. Repeat them only as necessary, more as a prayer.

When my heart is thus engaged, a deep peace comes over me at the end of my meditation. And I sit and I rise with that peace. When I rise from prayer and go about my business, I still feel the world with all its hard edges: choices to be made that force me to close one door in order to open another; loving another heart and soul all the while knowing how contingent and fragile life is; watching the politics of our time play out around the world, with my role being very tiny, well-nigh insignificant; facing the environmental crisis we are all living through; knowing the financial limitations and hardship for more and more folk. These are hard edges we all scrape against all the time. How do we then live?

As I let this mystery sink in, this mystery that *God so loved the world*, a whole world opens before me right in the sharp edges. God does not love us in another world but in *this* one, the way it is right now. Not only in a hereafter world that will be sparkling and golden, but this hard edged one.

'Okay,' you might say – so what?

So, this world, and not another, brings forth pearls, lots and lots of pearls astoundingly beautiful to behold, pearls which take our breath away. They have names: kindness, tenderness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, mercy, and yes sometimes these pearls are made of tears. It is not that suffering, or heartbreak, are good, they most certainly are not! But given that we all come to this at some point in this journey we call life in the world, that this *is* our world, it is here too that Divine love has chosen to shine through and give us what even the angels do not know from the inside.

God so loved the world.

To have experienced just once, a blessed power that came over us—to have shown mercy, to have been the recipient of mercy, to have forgiven, to have been forgiven, to look back and say with all my faults I have remained faithful, and another has remained faithful to me, to have known tenderness, to have held a baby quivering with life in your arms, is to live in this hard-edged world and experienced beauty, the sublime ecstasy of living as a human being on the earth I was born in.

Love is God's most intimate name. Sometimes it is a deep secret, until we recognize it where we do not expect it, in the suffering, even the heartbreak, in the hard edges we scrape up against all the time in this life of ours, lived in this world of ours.



Session Update - Membership at Central

Membership in the church is a sign of personal commitment to Christ, as well as one's connection to a particular branch of Christ's body. In the Presbyterian church, our polity affords members the right (and responsibility) for the annual budget of the church, electing and being elected as elders, appointing trustees, and calling a minister. When it comes to the calling of a minister, especially, we need to update our roll of professing members to be current because we will need the



signature or agreement of every single member if possible (and no less than 90%) in order to have the call approved by the Presbytery.

Part of the duty of the Session is to maintain this roll, and to ensure regular contact with all members, encouraging their participation in the life of the congregation, and attendance at communion. This is the reason behind the timing of *Contact*, to be delivered by elders just before each communion. Session is also responsible for receiving new members (by transfer from another congregation, or by profession of faith) and removing members from the roll (by transfer out, or resolution of session) as people move away, or withdraw from congregational life.

In order to update our roll in preparation for a call, the session has sent letters to a number of members whom we may not have seen for some time; someone you know may even have received such a letter. Our hope and prayer is that we may see them once again in our midst, or can transfer their membership if they are active in another church. Some of these names will be removed by resolution of Session simply because we have lost contact. If ever these members return to Central, another resolution can restore them to our roll. Session has done both of these things in recent years as part of our ongoing congregational oversight.

When removing the name of a member from our roll as part of this process, the Session is in no way passing judgement. As a church in the Reformed tradition, we believe that salvation is by faith alone, and that is about our relationship with God. The Session, or the church are in no way gatekeepers in the faith; we are called to love and welcome all in God's name, and to encourage all in their faith. We have many 'adherents' (as faithful non-members are referred to) who participate in the life, and even leadership of the church. While it is encouraged as a personal commitment, one does not need to be a member (or even a presbyterian) to worship with us, or to receive communion. The table is Christ's, not ours, and if you listen carefully to the invitation to the table during communion you will hear that clearly stated.

Membership in the church can be an important part of your faith journey, a way of living into your discipleship, and of making a public commitment to follow Jesus. Membership at Central may be part of this, but we are only one small part of the church. Our roll should reflect the names of those who maintain an active connection in any way to this particular congregation. The simple truth of the matter is, that whether you are a member of Central or not, you matter because you matter to God. The 2024 Budget that was approved at the Congregational meeting had expenses greater than revenues in the amount of \$176,781 and the Trustees have provided some temporary funding (over the amounts they had previously committed) by diverting funds that would be normally accumulated for major repairs to the building.

<u>Note</u>: The Revenues and Expenses year-to-date are presented here for your prayerful consideration. That said, members of the Session, Board of Trustees, as well as RMC, are working diligently to secure funding from sources outside congregational giving. This is to support and to ensure that Worship, Fellowship and Mission here at Central may flourish well into the future.

Pastoral Care Update from Rev. Lois Whitwell

"The only constant is change" means nothing stays the same forever. This phrase comes from a wise man named Heraclitus from long ago Greece. He saw that all things in life keep moving and shifting. Fall is certainly speeding along here at Central, and we have been blessed with several excellent musical events in the last few months. Firstly, our Central Choir has performed some incredible anthems since starting up again after the summer break. My personal favorite was Edward Elgar's 'Ave Verum Corpus,' a work of tremendous beauty and introspection, and we had wonderful praise after our performance of John Rutter's 'Look At The World' for our Thanksgiving Day service. At the time of this publication, we have already been diligently practicing for our upcoming Candlelight Carol Service on December 8th, in addition to all the joyful music for the upcoming Advent and Christmas season.

Our 2024-2025 Music@Central Sunday matinee chamber music series has also begun: our first concert was on Oct. 6th, which featured myself as both violin and piano soloist. I performed a fun and virtuosic program including works by Chopin, Bach, Leclair and Liszt, including a virtual "violin duet" with myself performing both parts (see the pictures included here). We had a very good audience turnout for a beautiful autumn day, which was exceeded at our next concert on Nov. 3rd! This second concert featured the Kodak String Quartet: the award-winning Cuker and Stern Resident String Ouartet at the Mannes School of Music in New York City. This ensemble has a personal connection as one of the violinists, Martin Noh, studied with me when I was teaching at Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo. I hadn't seen him since 2016, and it's been amazing to see his success and how his career is developing. The Kodak Quartet executed an astounding performance of Beethoven's monumental String Quartet No. 8, Op. 59 No. 2, part of the Razumovsky cycle, as well as Anton Webern's 'Langsamer Satz' and an excerpt from John Zorn's 'Cat O'Nine Tails'.

Our upcoming M@C concert on Dec. 1st features the Devah Quartet, truly a rockstar multi-genre ensemble: not only do they perform original compositions by their cellist Liza

McLellan, but they also play favorite pop tunes by Guns N' Roses, Coldplay, Rush, and many more. This will certainly be an energetic and electrifying concert!

Central has also had some notable concerts in our sanctuary recently: on Nov. 2nd, we welcomed 'That Choir' from Toronto, and on Nov. 8th we hosted RCCO's (Royal Canadian College of Organists) event which featured virtuoso organist Sarah Svendson. Although over a century old, our sanctuary continues to be a relevant and cultural centerpiece in our city.
