A/C Appeal




We need A/C units in the nursery, two offices and a meeting room on the main floor.

April 13, 10:30 A.M. Palm/Passion Sunday Service of Worship



For many, the procession of the palms re-enacted by children of our church schools is a vivid and lasting memory of this day. But once you know the whole story of this week, it is hard to see Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem except as set against his passion—betrayal, humiliation and death.

Since about the fourth century, the joy of Christ's triumphal entry has been set in deliberate contrast to the passion narrative. This, the first Sunday in Holy Week, begins the seven days of redemption drama.

Maundy Thursday, Maundy from the Latin *Mandatum*, meaning commandment. Jesus said, ³⁴ I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵ By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'



Prompts for Reflection

The Dream of the Rood, is one of the earliest English poems to be found in written form. The poem was first discovered on the Ruthwell Cross, a large stone carving dating to the early eighth century.

It is an explicitly Christian poem that attempts to appeal to Anglo-Saxons from a pagan culture.

An unknown poet dreams that he encounters a beautiful tree. It is the "rood," or cross, on which Jesus Christ was crucified. The rood tells the poet how it had been forced to be the instrument of Christ's death, describing how it, too, experienced the nails and spear thrusts along with the savior. But it is now, the dazzling sign of humankind's redemption.
